HAVE YOU RECEIVED A 2011 VOUCHER FOR A PREVENTATIVE DEN-TAL CHECK FOR YOUR TEENAGER UNDER THE COMMONWEALTH TEEN DENTAL PROGRAM?

Do you know that the Goulburn public dental clinic employs a registered dental therapist who can provide dental treatment for people up to the age of 18 years?

Do you know that if you have received a dental voucher from Medicare for a preventive dental check that you can use your voucher and have a dental therapist provide the service for you at the Goulburn clinic? The vouchers are only valid for the calendar year in which they are issued.

To use this service you will need to call the oral health intake service on **1 800 450 046** to register. You need to advise staff that you have a Medicare Teen Dental Program voucher. There are some clinics that do have a waiting list and at others you will receive an appointment quite quickly. You will need to take your voucher and your Medicare card to your appointment. The public dental clinic will bulk bill so you won't have to pay.



FIELD WORK EXCURSION AT CRONULLA BEACHES

The year 10 fieldwork excursion to Cronulla presented students with a unique opportunity to experience first-hand the nature and management of a coastal environment.

An early start on a cold morning in Goulburn was not the ideal conditions for a day at the beach, as students who wore shorts quickly found out. After a short trip down the highway, we found ourselves in Cronulla and ready for our first chance to examine the fragile balance of intertidal wetlands. The Mangrove Boardwalk looked almost as fragile as the ecosystem itself and allowed students to move amidst the mangroves and to look out to Botany Bay and beyond. They gained an appreciation for how mangroves function and the impact of human activity on this fragile environment.

From the mangroves, we moved to Silver Beach where we had the opportunity to examine the groynes on Silver Beach, which were established to stop long-shore drift and deposition move to the centre of the bay. This vital management strategy was put in place to keep Botany Bay open to car-go ships and support Australian industry. Students drew sketch maps of the groynes and paced out the distance between the groynes to fully appreciate the extent of this government funded coastal management strategy.

Cronulla Beach and lunch was the next stop as students had the opportunity to pause and take in some food and drink. The sun began to shine and the scenic nature of this famous beach was on full display. Work needed to be completed however, as students needed to answer questions about high impact waves on coastal landforms. The students completed a field sketch of the area and noted the proximity of development to the coast.

During the day, the students gained a sense of the stresses that various human activities can have on coastal environments, such as sandmining, the landfill, the sewerage treatment plant, the desalination plant, the oil refinery, the port, housing development and infrastructure. Having experienced firsthand the ethereal mangroves and beautiful Cronulla beach, they appreciated the importance of managing the coast so its utility is preserved for future generations.

The day was a great success and the fieldwork was very beneficial to year 10 students who will sit their School Certificate exams next term. The behaviour and enthusiasm of the students made the day very pleasant for all teachers involved. Big thanks to Mr Chin and Mr Mani for organising the excursion. TRAINING OPPORTUNITY: YEAR 10

TAFE Illawarra are offering a short course in Wool Handling to be run in Week 7 $23^{rd} - 25^{th}$ November, in the classroom at Goulburn TAFE and Week 8 $5^{th} - 7^{th}$ December off campus in the workplace. This will follow Work Experience.

Year 10 students are invited to participate, and will receive a Certificate II upon successful completion of the course, which can be used as credit towards further courses such as Agriculture Cert. III, Wool Clip Preparation Cert. III and Wool Classing Cert IV.

COST: The cost of the course is \$225, however the school is able to subsidise this cost by \$125 per person, enabling students to receive a CERT II qualification for only \$100.
