

### PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

As the term comes to an end, it is time to wish our year 12 students well in their exams and the best for their future. Our year 12 farewell assembly will be held on Thursday 20<sup>th</sup> September in our school hall. Whilst year 12 gets ready for their exams, year 11 students are starting theirs. The preliminary HSC exams will run from 11<sup>th</sup> to 18<sup>th</sup> September. We wish our year 11 students all the best and expect them to aim high and do their best. Recently, a group of our students travelled to Wollongong to participate in the Southern Stars dance and music spectacular. This was the culmination of many months of hard work and preparation, rehearsing different dance rou-

tines that were finally performed in front of an audience of thousands at the live show. Thanks to the hard work of Mrs Stephenson, Miss Jordan and all our dancers, our students looked spectacular in their costumes performing their routines. A very big well done and congratulations! Last week, selections of end of year activities took place. It is vital that students get to school on time and attend classes each morning. This will allow the school to determine which students are genuinely late from those who are not putting in their best effort to be at school on time. There are consequences for students who are continually late without a note. A reminder that the school is not currently sending SMS messages to parents when their child is away due to technical issues. Parents will need to ensure they write notes explaining their child's absence until the system is restored.

### IMPORTANT REMINDER TO ALL STUDENTS AND PARENTS

### Skateboards, Scooters and Bicycles

The school is very concerned about the safety of students riding these modes of transport to school, as little or no protective gear is often worn despite students riding on concrete and roads, sometimes at considerable speed.

In addition to this issue, a number of thefts of scooters, parts of scooters and skateboards have taken place previously and this has caused great concern, and on some occasions, has led to the police being contacted.

As a result of the safety issue and the inability to store student scooters and skateboards securely, the school has banned students from bringing scooters, skateboards and/or similar modes of transport to school under any circumstances. Bicycles may be ridden to school, but should not be ridden once on school grounds. The school does provide a bike rack for the secure storage of bikes, where students supply their own lock. The school does encourage all bike riders to wear a helmet for their own safety and we ask that parents support the school with this requirement.

With valuable data collected, we moved on to Silver Beach which is undergoing significant changes. Long-shore drift has played havoc with various industries, in particular the ever increasing Botany Bay Port facilities. Students completed field sketches of the human activities in the Bay and the establishment of groynes to effectively manage the issue.

After a well-earned lunch in Cronulla it was back to work at South Cronulla Beach. The beach is a high energy location with numerous rip patterns and consistent issues with beach erosion. Beach management was the focus for the third site of the day, with management of the location the central theme.
