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Visiting artist offers a helping hand in the class room

Last term, Goulburn High School was the studio for an artist in residence. Erica Wrigley is currently in her third year of her Visual Arts degree with a major in painting at the Australian National University. Her time with us was funded by the ANU Equity Office. The reason is to help students understand that university is an option after year 12.

Erica was asked, "What do you speak to the students about?" She replied," My art and my practice with years 7-11 and then I show them examples in the flesh, including my visual diaries. The students are also welcomed and encouraged to ask questions and watch me paint during class time."

Students who have been exposed to a young practising Australian artist realise that studying Visual Arts is an option for their future and that they have access to resources through school. The students could see the practical side of Art. Taking the theory out of text books and bringing it into their worlds was another of the benefits Erica felt she had brought to the students.

One highlight for the students was seeing the artist's visual diaries and asking questions about the role of the diaries in her art, which made their own visual diaries more relevant. An aspect that Erica found exciting was how different age groups reacted differently to her work and her ideas.

Erica created some portraits for students while talking them through the process of observation and giving them drawing tips. Erica commented, "Being at university, I have the opportunity to experience residencies like this and I'm able to share some of my knowledge and interest with the students."

Erica's own education in both primary and secondary school was surrounded with art. She was exposed to many artists and a lot of art history. This infiltrated her ideas and techniques. "Working alongside Di Smith was fantastic. Being in her classes reminded me how high school was and the importance of the information supplied by the teachers," Erica stated. "The students have so much energy and when you can give them a creative outlet it gives them the satisfaction of producing something that is their own," was one thing that Erica found when working with the students. Every class responded positively and participation was excellent. It was exciting watching the students involved in the things Erica instituted.

"I found this experience so energetic I would do it again in a heartbeat," Erica said.
