## His Excellency the Governor-General Sir Peter Cosgrove and Lady Cosgrove visited Goulburn High School

Thursday the 8<sup>th</sup> of October proved itself to be a very important morning for students and staff at Goulburn High School. The Governor-General, General the Honourable Sir Peter Cosgrove AK MC (Retd) and Lady Cosgrove attended the morning meeting with all staff, Deputy Principal Vero Joseph and Principal Peter Browne. Mr Browne introduced the student leaders and informed the Governor-General and Lady Cosgrove about the daily structure of Goulburn High School. The meeting was held in the heritage listed main building of the school, and Mr Browne was able to share the success of two outstanding senior students, Emmot Faulkner for excellence in Music and Ellen Ryan, who is expected to represent Australia at the 2018 Commonwealth Games in single and mixed pair's bowling, with staff and guests.

Afterwards Sir Peter addressed the staff, thanking them for the opportunity to 'be part of' the regular morning muster and told of his passion for education and its importance in a warm and sincere speech. He then took the opportunity to visit a Year 9 Geography class who were studying a topographic map of New Guinea, and was able to speak about his involvement with the Australian Army to help and support this nation after a natural disaster.

He was later introduced to year 10 student, Dallas Strettles, and year 8 student, Vida Macintosh, who invited the guests to view a separate learning and display space decorated with Aboriginal dot paintings and Aboriginal instruments, all created by GHS students. The Governor-General and Lady Cosgrove continued to inspect the recently designed 'Bush Tucker' Aboriginal garden on the corner of Goldsmith and Deccan Street, planted with native flora by the Anti-Racism Contact Officer, Mr Stephen Boyd, and students.

Sir Peter chatted with Par Cer Thi Hlum, an ESL student originally from Myanmar (Burma) and her teacher, Mr Dennis Carroll, and was very interested to hear about GHS's educational program supporting students from various countries such as China, Indonesia, Liberia and Uganda.

The students and staff of Goulburn High School were honoured to host such an important member of Australia's political and social connections to Britain.

The P&C have been busy organising the new <u>Goulburn High Uniform Shop</u> which will be situated in the canteen area within the school. The shop will be constructed by the school construction team and Mr White. The P&C and the school uniform committee have decided on the same uniform with the following minor changes:

1) Navy fleecy jacket will replace the current polar fleece jumper.

- 2) Girls tartan shorts will be introduced.
- 3) New style sports shirt (different collar colours and gold replacing yellow in the panelling).
- 4) Sports shorts and tracksuits will become available.
- 5) Senior girls white shirts now have a much more flattering ladies cut with navy piping on the collar and sleeves.
- 6) Junior Girls shirt remain the same colour with a more flattering ladies style cut.

The cost of our uniform should not change. There may be a small difference in price and this can go either way. Please be aware there will be no dramatic price increases. We are hoping to make this an improved and much easier option for families. Our shop will be up and running in January 2016 at the latest, the week before school starts back. We would like to ask that parents support our uniform. The profits from our uniform sales will be returned to the P&C which in turn will go directly back into the school for our students.

There will also be a position made available as a Uniform Shop Co-Ordinator. Applications are now open and can be picked up from the school office, and returned back to the school office, Attention to P&C Secretary.

Shop opening hours are yet to be made definite. It will be approximately 6–8 hours per week for purchasing. We will be aiming for the shop to open for the full week before school starts back. Volunteers will also be required to help out within the shop at times. If you feel like this is something you can help with, please leave your name and contact details in an envelope at the school office Attention to P&C Secretary.

Online ordering and payments will be made available through our shop and then pick up from the school. This will save students carrying larger amounts of money to school.

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**National Maritime Museum**

## CHS Boy's Hockey State Champions

The Open Boy's Hockey Team have been crowned NSW State Champions after a successful 2 days at the Top 8 carnival.

The team had successfully qualified for the carnival after recording comprehensive victories against Mulwaree, Crookwell, Moss Vale and Kirrawee High Schools. This qualified the boys for the Top 8 carnival which was held over 2 days in Liverpool on the 9<sup>th</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup> of September.

The quarter final game was against a strong Farrer Memorial Agricultural High School side. The Goulburn team came out strong in the first half, linking well and dominating possession and territory. This lead to numerous scoring opportunities with the boys taking a 3 nil lead into half time. After half time it was a different story. The Farrer side were completing more passes and had Goulburn pinned in their own half. Farrer were pressuring Goulburn into mistakes and they scored 2 goals to make the score 3-2. The last 5 minutes were tense as Farrer threw everything at Goulburn, however the boys were able to hold on to progress in the Semi Final game.

The Semi Final was against Lithgow who were coming off a strong victory against their quarter final opponent. Both teams started sluggishly, finding their rhythm and passing. Goulburn were first to score through Jake Staines, however Lithgow hit back to score the next 2 goals to put them 2-1 up. This spurred the GHS side into action and the boys lifted a gear, linking well and creating plenty of chances. GHS were able to score three goals before half time to give themselves a 4-2 lead. Determined to not let their previous games second half repeat, GHS came out strong limiting Lithgow's possession and hemming them in their own half. GHS scored the next 2 goals to put the game beyond doubt, taking the win 7-3 and putting them into the Final for the second consecutive year.





The final was against Grafton High School the next day. The boys turned up refreshed and determined to go one result better than last year. A surprise visit from super coach, Peter Lucas, had the boys fired up and with some inspiring words Luco sent the boys out.

GHS started strongly with the Staines boys creating plenty of havoc. Ryan Grice and Nic Patton were solid in the midfield supplying plenty of ball to the forwards. Goulburn were first to score through Jake Staines, however Grafton replied immediately through a short corner. The game ebbed and flowed at both ends before Goulburn scored 3 quick goals to Grafton's one to lead 4-2 at half time.

The boys took advantage of the break to refresh before a final 30 minutes to try and claim the win. The boys continued to work well as a team and they were able to score the next goal which proved decisive. This lifted the boys confidence and with time winding down, they cruised to a 7-3 victory making Goulburn High the CHS State Champions for the first time since 1971.

The boys are to be congratulated on a fantastic achievement. They have been fantastic ambassadors for the school. A particular thankyou to all the Year 12 boys who have played in this side for numerous years. A fitting way to go out.
